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Join Our Journey: Riparian Area Rehabilitation at Melba House

Through funding provided by the Department of Environment and Science's Community Sustainability Action Grants—Round 7, PCL has commenced the rehabilitation of the riparian area adjacent to the locally significant historical building, Melba House in Marian. Previously infested with Leucaena (*Leucaena leucocephala*), the site was first cleared of invasive weeds, opening up the access point to the Pioneer River at Edward Lloyd Park. The purpose of the project is to revegetate the area with native riparian species to create shade, biodiversity and a refuge for native wildlife, while preventing the return of invasive weeds.

This project also aims to encourage local community empowerment through an engaging and inclusive approach to rehabilitation of this site, by inviting community members, groups and volunteers to become a part of the journey.

The first community planting day was held on Tuesday 8th August in which 500 native plants were put in the ground thanks to the 13 PCL volunteers and 100 students and teachers from Marian State School.

Native Plant of the Month

Powderpuff Lilly-pilly Syzygium wilsonii

Family: Myrtaceae

Small shrub growing 1 to 3m tall with very attractive red fluffy flowers, clusters of edible fruit and weeping branches. Versatile plant that can be easily incorporated into your garden. Wildlife attracting.

Leaves: Lanceolate new foliage reddish brown in colour. Stiff narrow leaves 180mm by 50mm, dark green, dull on upper surface and paler on underneath side of leaf.

Flowers: Only species of lilly-pilly with red flowers. Large, fluffy heads, flowering from spring to summer.

Seeds/Fruit: White clusters of ovoid-shaped fleshy edible fruits.

Habitat: Endemic to North Queensland rainforests.

Growing Notes: Easily propagated from seed. Keep moist and plant in sheltered position. Can also grow from cuttings.

Pest Spotting

Balloon Vine Cardiospermum grandiflorum

Family: Sapindaceae

Perennial climber that can completely cover trees and is common along creeks, rainforest margins, and moist gullies. Classed in Queensland as Category 3 restricted invasive plant under the *Biosecurity Act 2014*.

Leaves/stems: Stems ribbed lengthwise, usually covered with stiff hairs, particularly when young. Compound leaves with leaflets in three groups of three, and often with a tendril in their forks. Leaflets (20-80mm long , 10-50mm wide) have coarsely toothed margins.

Flowers: Small white flowers borne in clusters at end of stalks that have two small curved tendrils near their tips.

Seeds/Fruit: Distinctive large, balloon-shaped, papery capsules (45-65mm long, 30-45mm wide) with three compartments, each containing a single hard seed.

Spread by: Seeds most commonly dispersed by wind and water, or dumped garden waste.

Ocean pollution education at C&K Marian

PCL officers enjoyed visiting C&K Marian Community Kindergarten last month to discuss the issue of ocean pollution caused by rubbish. Following discussions with the children, we organised two engaging activities. In the first one, the children had an ocean-themed tub filled with rubbish, and they enthusiastically picked and sorted the trash into the appropriate bins. The second activity involved the kids using recycled clothing for seaweed and other recyclable

materials to create their vision of an ideal ocean on paper plates, where no rubbish could be found. It was a creative and inspiring session!





Janes Creek Reveg Site Rejuvenated

In March 2023, PCL took over the maintenance of Janes Creek, which was remodelled by TMR as part of the bypass works. The area was interplanted with native species such as Blue Flax Lily (*Dianella caerulea*), Weeping Bottlebrush (*Melaleuca viminalis*), Lemon Myrtle (*Backhousia citiodora*), Creek Cherry (*Syzygiun australe*) and Narrow Leaf Honey Myrtle (*Melaleuca trichostachya*). Since March, PCL field officers have conducted weed control, watering, mulching, and monitoring of plant growth, which has been good with the warmer winter and extra rain. The planting is visible from the road on the left-hand side of the bridge crossing Janes Creek as you head towards Mackay along the Bruce Highway. Well done to the staff at PCL for the ongoing care and maintenance that has lead to the successful revegetation of this important riparian environment.

PCL staff and volunteers attended the NTD site at Finch Hatton on a wet and windy morning on the 28th of July 2023. The clouds were low, and the drizzle just kept coming, interspersed with periods of heavier rain. Despite the wet weather most of the booked schools brought scores of children to help plant over 3000 trees — what an amazing effort by all! The event was really well organised by Mackay Regional Council, with buses bringing the schools in at intervals throughout the day. The primary school aged children came in groups of 15 to 48! Students planted and then mulched their trees, with some children even affectionately naming their new tree companions. A big shout out to our volunteers who braved the cold and wet conditions to help out with planting with the local school children, we couldn't have done it without you!

PCL staff attended the community tree planting at Sandfly Creek, Mackay on a bright and sunny Sunday morning on the 30th July. The event was well attended with over 750 trees being planted before 10am! A good representation of the community attended with children through to the elderly coming to join in the fun and plant trees to improve our regions biodiversity and habitat. Did you know since National Tree Day started in 1996 over 26 million trees have been planted in Australia? This is fantastic news for our regions' improved shade, our native plants and wildlife that use trees for food and shelter, and for our carbon sequestering; all helping to improve the health of our environment.

Native Bonsai Workshop Success

PCL ran the first ever Native Plant Bonsai Workshop open to the public on Saturday 29th July in support of National Tree Day. The workshop booked out quickly as the numbers were capped at 20. The afternoon was bright and clear. We gathered at the Mackay Regional Botanic Gardens nursery which has an amazing shaded area with excellent facilities for playing with plants. Each participant had a choice of 4 native plants – *Melaleuca hemisticta* (Gold dusted bottle brush), *Ficus virens* (Strangler fig), *Casuarina cunninghamiana* (She-oak), *Syzygium australe* (Lilly pilly). Each tree had an information sheet attached giving a little bit of information on what the botanical name means and where it is found.



Michael Watts (an experienced and passionate Bonsai grower) facilitated the workshop and his passion for native plants was obvious. He took us all on a journey of creativity, passion, knowledge and fun, sharing his tools and his experience with us so all participants took home a Bonsai they had created. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with everyone expressing how much they had enjoyed the experience and taken something from it. This event was

run in association with Mackay Regional Botanic Gardens.





Experimenting with Salt Couch Propagation

Part of the current Mackay Port Access Project (MPAP) encompasses intertidal areas and communities including mangroves and salt marsh. It is likely that rehabilitation will be required for these areas impacted as part of the development and PCL was approached to assist in trials to establish best practice rehabilitation. Salt couch is a protected marine plant and was harvested from the old tip site on Harbour Road. Harvested plant material was propagated in tiles to see growth response to various potting media and fertiliser content. The experiment has half of the plant material in the Swayne Street nursery (propagated by PCL volunteers) and half on PCL's Coordinator Nancy's farm. The separation of the plant material was due to biosecurity at the nursery and all soil had to be removed from nursery stock. Initial observations are interesting with growth being faster on the farm than in nursery, and tiles with fertiliser

not responding well.
