### **Native Plant of the Month**

# Sophora tomentosa subsp. australis – Silver Bean, Bead Tree

#### Family: Leguminosae

**Description:** Hardy bushy, evergreen shrub/small tree with almost weeping habit. It has stunning yellow pea flowers and seed pods like strings of beads. Up to 5m height.

 $\mbox{\bf Distribution:}$  Beaches and in beach forest on NT, CYP, NEQ, CEQ, south to N.NSW.

**Leaves:** Silvery grey, alternate, compound, 100-200mm long, with 11-17, ovate (egg shaped) to more-or-less circular leaflets, 20-40mm long by 10-30mm wide; upper side velvety; underside densely velvet hairy. The petiolules (stalk of a leaflet), 2-5mm long.

**Flowers**: Yellow, on axillary or terminal racemes with the youngest flower at the apex. Flower standard about 15mm long; calyx (collective term for sepals) green, about 6 mm long; corolla (collective term for petals) 20–25mm long, pale yellow. Flowers in late winter.

**Fruits**: Brown or grey velvety hairy, indehiscent pods, 100–180mm long and up to 14mm in diameter, strongly constricted between up to 10 smooth, olive, brown or black seeds each about 6mm long.

**Growing notes**: Tolerates exposed sites and coastal areas. Excellent addition to the garden and suitable for the smaller yard.

Indehiscent = doesn't split open spontaneously when ripe.

# Pest Spotting

#### Vulpes vulpes - European fox - Canidae

**Description:** The European Red Fox was deliberately introduced to Australia for recreational hunting in 1855 and fox populations became established in the wild in the early 1870s. Within 100 years, the fox had spread across most of Australia.

**Habitat:** The fox survives in many different habitats, including urban, alpine, and arid areas. Outside urban areas, it appears to be most abundant in lightly wooded areas that are typically found in agricultural landscapes offering a wide variety of shelter and food.

Threats to Australia: Many native animal species are predated on by foxes. The fox has played a major role in the decline of ground-nesting birds, small to medium sized mammals, and reptiles such as marine turtles. Predation by foxes continues to undermine recovery efforts for threatened species. The fox causes significant economic losses to farmers by preying on newborn lambs, kid goats and poultry. The fox could also act as a carrier of rabies, should the disease accidentally be introduced into Australia.

**Control:** Predation by the European Red Fox' is listed as a key threatening process under the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (the EPBC Act). Under the EPBC Act, the Australian Government, in consultation with the states and territories, has developed the Threat Abatement Plan for Predation by the European Red Fox.

Current control methods include baiting, trapping, and shooting. Conservation detector dogs are used to detect fox dens which can then be destroyed.



# Mangrove Mouse monitoring at Sandringham Bay Conservation Park update

The Sandringham Bay Mangrove Mouse Monitoring Project kicked off on March 13th with clear goals: to monitor the local Mangrove Mouse population and to educate and engage the community on threatened species and regional ecosystems.

In mid-April, we reached a significant milestone as we retrieved the cameras set up during the project's inception. Despite our efforts, no mangrove mice were detected. However, this setback presented an opportunity for growth. Nola, one of our members, who missed the initial setup was eager to contribute. We guided her through using GPS to locate cameras and instructed her on camera operations.

Back in the office, Nola and PCL Project Officer Danny analysed the collected data. Every piece of information gathered contributed to our understanding of flora and fauna in the reserve, aiding in the identification of potential threats to the mouse population, such as pest animals. After the information has been analysed it will be sent through to Queensland Parks and Wildlife Services which can contribute and feed into the pest animal programs.



- Ghania aspera (Sword Sedge)
- Pandorea jasminoides (Bower of Beauty)
- Backhousia citriodora (Lemon-scented Myrtle)
- Alpinia caerulea (Native Ginger)
- Mentha sp. (Native Mint)
- Dodonaea viscosa subsp. viscosa (Sticky Hop Bush)
- Glycosmis trifoliata ( Pink Lime)

Amidst giggles and curious questions, we shared the joy of planting and nurturing life. It wasn't just about beautifying the garden; it was about fostering a sense of wonder and stewardship for our environment.


